Pre-Service candidates went to visit Geo International High School and other schools that have students from refugee camps. Candidates interact with refugee students & met with classroom teachers to learn strategies in working with limited English proficient students. All candidates in the fundamentals courses (EDUC 3413 – Fundamentals of Elementary and Middle Grades Education and EDUC 3403 – Fundamentals of Secondary Education) are required to tutor limited English proficient students in surrounding schools. Candidates are required to spend a minimum of 3 contact hours with their assigned student to create and implement strategies based on the student's needs and strengths and reflect on this experience in their field logs. Differentiated instruction, embedded in the lesson plan templates, clearly indicate how instruction meets the needs of diverse learners. Continued professional development opportunities are provided annually to students to address any changes in this area. The unit incorporates exceptional child instruction in all of its teacher education programs. All lesson plans must develop appropriate accommodations for those identified students, as well as those students who may need adaptions to instructional strategies and/or assessments. Additionally, differentiated instruction in the methods courses

ensures lesson plans include instruction for Gifted & Talented Students. Tiered instruction is identified /planned in lesson and unit plan instruction across EPP courses. Strategies for those students with limited English (ELLs) and those students from low-income families are studied in multiple courses, including methods course, curriculum / methodology, and classroom management. Education candidates also participate in various service learning projects, and leadership project, with our area schools during which they work with students from all backgrounds. Students complete their Practicum in a diverse school setting. The college provides transportation for this immersive three week experience.
